



- OUR VISION: All children achieve success in life.
- **OUR MISSION:** Provide children facing adversity with strong and enduring, professionally supported one-to-one relationships that change their lives for the better, forever.
- ACCOUNTABILITY STATEMENT: We partner with parents/guardians, volunteers, and others in the community and hold ourselves accountable for each child in our program achieving: 1) Higher aspirations, greater confidence, and better relationships; 2) Avoidance of risky behaviors; and 3) Educational success.
- Our goal is for Big Brothers Big Sisters to be the organization of choice for youth mentoring, corporate and community partnering, fund raising, staff and board membership.
- Safety is the most important service we provide for our Bigs and Littles. Our professional staff provides extensive screening, ongoing mentoring and match support.

In the 70's we were known as Big Brothers of Vineland, serving boys referred by family court and mentored by lawyers, police officers, doctors, and prominent business professionals.

In 1982 we became Big Brothers Big Sisters of Cumberland County, serving boys and girls, ages 7 through 18, throughout Cumberland County that were primarily referred by a relative or teacher.

Since 1995, **High School and School-Based Programs have** grown from one school to 20 public schools and 1 private school in 6 school districts throughout Cumberland and Salem Counties. This program allows adults and high school students to visit the elementary and middle school students on a weekly basis.

Since 2002, **3,276 boys and girls** have been served in a **oneto-one mentoring relationship** through our program.

In December 2004, **Mentoring Children of Prisoners Program** was launched. This unique one to one mentoring program pairs adult volunteers with children who are growing up with a parent in prison.

In 2005 our service area expanded to include Salem County. In 2012, 275 children, our Littles, had a Big Brother or Big Sister while 128 children continued to wait for their Big. All matched and waiting Littles were able to participate in special events and client activities throughout the year.

In 2012, 104 high school students were mentors to Elementary School children in the High School Mentoring Programs.

In 2012, all Littles and their families were able to participate in holiday parties and received assistance in the form of food baskets, gifts, toys, clothing, and gift certificates made possible by generous donations from the community.

"Littles" in our program come from diverse racial, cultural and economic demographics and more than 50% of our Littles are males.



Community Based is our traditional one-to-one mentoring program that follows the model established ${\cal P}$ in 1904. The primary reason for enrollment in this program is to establish a friendship for a child with a volunteer who can provide consistent support. Numerous research studies show that BBBS mentoring has a significant and measurable positive impact on the lives of youth. > Children matched with a Big Brother or Big Sister are less likely to take illegal drugs, start drinking alcohol, skip school, or exhibit violent behavior. Big Brothers Big Sisters of Cumberland & Salem Counties received national recognition from Big Brothers Big Sisters of America. Among 400 agencies this agency received The Gold Standard Award for pace setting performance in quality growth and increased revenue, and in the small agency category the Board of Trustees were finalists for Board of the Year, and the President/CEO received the CEO of the Year Award. Kernda Bundy, Big Sister of the Year for the State of New Jersey in 2012, has been a Big Sister in the Community Based Program since 2008. Tina DiNicola, Big Sister of the Year for the State of New Jersey in 2011, has been a Big Sister in the Community Based Program since 2006.
